In the coming Easter Week, Fr. Gerard and myself we will continue to celebrate Mass each day, alternating, at 10.00.am. It is great to know that so many of you are with us. It is also great to feel this growing connection between all of us in the Pendle district, centred on Nelson and Colne with the cooperation of the two parishes. I believe this will bear fruit for the future. Thank God.

Please continue to pray for and with each other, remembering those who are sick, those who are struggling in whatever way, and especially those who have to put themselves at some risk to serve others, especially in the NHS, but there are so many others who keep us all supplied and able to live with a continued degree of normality. I would also commend to your prayers the soul of James Brennan of Nelson who has died and will be buried during this coming week. May he rest in peace.
