Dear Parishioners and Friends,

Today's reading from John's Gospel introduces Jesus as the worker of miracles! Jesus, at first seemingly hesitant to reveal his divine power, responds to the prompting of his mother to make an intervention into the awkward situation of the wine shortage at the wedding feast. Jesus responds by famously turning water into wine! So, this is the story, but for us and for John—the writer of the Gospel—the deeper meanings of the story is where our real interest lies.

John's concern is to present Jesus in the fullness of his divinity. The divinity of Jesus is what marks out Jesus as totally unique. There have been, throughout history, holy and wise persons a plenty; there have been many religious leaders and inspirational characters, but there is only one Son of God and consequently only one true religion legitimated and validated by God himself. Later in his Gospel, John will put these words on to the lips of Jesus, "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life, no one can come to the Father except through me"

At the centre of God's concern is the well-being of human beings. It takes a massive step of faith to believe that in the enormity and complexity of the universe, cast across unimaginable expanses of space and time, we as human beings are supremely important to God. This view stands in stark contrast to the scientific perspective that suggests that the human species is merely a random and rather quirky product of purely natural and physical processes!

The dynamic of the Christian religion is that, in Jesus, God is drawing us up into his divine life! In the story of the Wedding Feast at Cana, water represents that which is natural and ordinary—a product of nature. The wine represents the intoxicating richness of the love of God. The work of Jesus is to bring about this transformation by which the 'natural' is raised up to be the 'supernatural'. Our work is simply to be open to grace in order to allow this to happen!

In John's Gospel, the explanation of how this transformational process takes place is apparent: we encounter Christ in his teaching, in being open to the Holy Spirit, and through our engagement with the Sacramental life of the Church. It is through the Sacraments of the Church that the supernatural aspect of our lives is nourished. Every aspect of our lives that is brought to the Lord is raised up and transformed; every aspect of our lives that we live independently from God remains exactly as it is: natural and ordinary. That which is natural and ordinary is temporary and limited, like the first consignment of wine which ran out! That which is transformed by grace is limitless... my cup shall overflow!

May we invite Jesus into all that we are and do.... We never know when we might need him!
